NEW CALL FOR APPLICATIONS

The IDASTP is proud to announce the IDASTP Award of Distinction. This award supports research activities of pre-doctoral students cross-scales research.

The Infectious Disease Across Scales Training Program's goal is to produce broadly trained and competitive scientists who use interdisciplinary cross-scale approaches to better understand and control infectious disease.

Eligibility

- Intended research should fit within the framework of cross-scales infectious disease dynamics and control.
- Applicants need to be rising 3rd, 4th or 5th students.
- Applicants must be enrolled in the IMP, PBEE or EHS programs.
- Before application, or upon acceptance to the program, students must enroll in the biweekly *Integrating Study and Control of Infectious Disease Across Scales* course and attend the biweekly IDAS Seminar Series, both of which are offered concurrently each spring semester.
- The program will seek applications from faculty to become members if their student is admitted to the program but the mentor is not yet a training member.

Support

- 5 students for the upcoming support year:
 - * Up to \$1,500 for research support (research supplies, travel, etc.) for 1 year.

Requirements: The trainee must:

- Complete course *Integrating Study and Control of Infectious Disease Across Scales* (Spring semester) (1 credit)
- Attend biweekly *IDAS Seminar Series* (Spring semester): seminar series with research and career presentations by program faculty and external speakers
- Attend annual IDAS Symposium (Fall or Spring semester)

- Application Letter (1-2 pages explaining how applicant research fits with the study of infectious disease across scales)
- Curriculum Vitae
- Transcript (unofficial)
- Two letters of recommendation from program faculty (1 from advisor).

- Award Notification – July 1, 2020
- Funding Begins – September 1, 2020
