In April, Vinod Thourani 2011 was awarded the first (inaugural) Emory University School of Medicine Discovery Medical Student Research Program Mentor Award.

Ravi Rajani 2017 was inducted into the Alpha Omega Society Honor Medical Society as a faculty inductee elected by AOA peers.

Patrick Sullivan 2016 received the Emory Williams Teaching Award. This award is given in recognition of a record of excellence in teaching. The designation represents the highest university honor for teaching given to a full-time faculty member. The award was established by Emory Williams, a 1932 Emory College alumnus and long-time trustee.

Viola Vaccarino 2010 received the Thomas F. Sellers, Jr., M.D. Award. This award is presented to the faculty member of the Rollins School of Public Health who exemplifies the ideals of public health and who serves as a role model and mentor to his or her colleagues. The award is given to an individual who, like the man for whom it is named, represents the best qualities of collegiality.

Sandra Franklin 2011, director of the Woodruff Health Sciences Center Library, was named a fellow of the Medical Library Association (MLA) at its May 2017 annual meeting. The designation is the group's highest honor, bestowed on members who are chosen by the Board of Directors for sustained and outstanding contributions to health sciences librarianship and to the advancement of the purposes of MLA. Sheryl Gabram-Mendola 2008 and colleagues from Winship's Glenn Family Breast Center are the recipients of a grant from the Avon Breast Cancer Crusade Board of Managers. The grant focuses on breast cancer outreach and clinical access for women in underserved communities.

Rafi Ahmed and **Ram Ramalingam 2017** led an investigative team showing how the protein CD28 can be used to predict a patient's response to certain cancer immunotherapies. The results of the study were published in *Science* and *PNAS*.

Grady's Georgia Cancer Center for Excellence received a five-year, \$2 million Merck Foundation Award as part of the new Alliance to Advance Patient-Centered Cancer Care. Morehouse School of Medicine's Roland Matthews, MD and Winship's **Sheryl Gabram-Mendola 2008** will lead the grant as principal investigator and co-principal investigator.

Scientists at Winship mapped a vast spider web of interactions between proteins in lung cancer cells in an effort to reach targets once considered "undruggable." Senior author Haian Fu 2015 and team published the results in *Nature Communications*.

Trish Haugaard 2005 and Mike Zwick 2016 envisioned and created a new career path supporting research and professional growth for non-faculty PhDs in bioinformatics.

Nominated by several of her current and former mentees, **Kathryn Yount 2012** was selected for the universitywide 2016 Emory Women of Excellence Award for Mentorship.

Elected Chair of the ACGME Residency Review Committee for Urology nationally, **Chad Ritenour 2005** will begin a 3-year term effective July 1, 2017.

Elizabeth Downes 2016 has been promoted to Clinical Professor of Nursing. She will also serve as MSN Program Director. In this role, she will provide leadership for the school's MSN programs and operations and will work with faculty and School of Nursing leadership to ensure continued excellence in preparing highly-skilled professional nurses for advanced nursing roles.

Elizabeth has served on the Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing faculty since September 2002, and previously served as specialty coordinator for the Family Nurse Practitioner/Nurse Midwifery dual specialty program. Her experience in international and public health nursing spans more than 25 years. As a Returned Peace Corps Volunteer, she understands first-hand the needs and challenges of providing quality health care in resource-poor countries and has dedicated her career to developing sustainable educational strategies to support the expansion of highly-skilled Advance Practice Nursing (APN) workforces at home and abroad. Her expertise in



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educational program development is internationally sought by such organizations as World Health Organization, USAID, the Department of State and the Carter Center. She has enhanced nursing clinical competency and capacity in more than a dozen countries, including Ethiopia, Fiji, Liberia, Mozambique, the Bahamas and Zimbabwe, significantly shaping the way nurses are trained and practice in these countries. The advanced practice nursing curriculum that she designed and implemented for the World Health Organization in the Western Pacific has created a sustainable domestic nursing workforce that can provide for population-specific needs of communities throughout the region. She has played a key role in the development of faculty continuing education and national curriculums for nursing schools in countries throughout Africa. Her textbook for educators, Educating Health Professionals in Low-Resource Countries, has shaped education and clinical training for health care professionals in many developing countries.

In addition to her work abroad, Elizabeth leads many initiatives to improve health outcomes and access for vulnerable international communities within the United States, including refugees and migrant farmer workers. She is the graduate nursing lead for the Farmworker Family Health Program in Moultrie, Ga. that provides care for more than 600 farmworker families every year. She developed and leads the school's Coverdell Peace Corps Fellowship program and Emory's nursing-specific Complex Humanitarian Emergencies that prepares nurses to assist in vulnerable countries destabilized by natural and man-made disasters.

She has received many notable honors for her work. She was recently named a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing. She is also a fellow of the American Academy of Nurse Practitioners and the National League for Nursing's Academy of Nursing Education and serves on the International Council of Nurses' Advanced Practice Nursing Network Policy sub-committee.

Elizabeth's knowledge and expertise has informed the Curriculum Committee and so many areas of our program. We are truly fortunate to have her as a resource and leader within the School of Nursing.
