<u>Accomplishments, Appointments, Awards...</u>

Last November, **Toni Wimby 2005**, MBA, MHA, FACHE was awarded the Max Holland Distinguished Alumni Award from the Georgia State University Institute of Health Administration. The award is given to an alumnus who has demonstrated through professional and personal achievements: leadership abilities, contributions to the field, contributions to the community, and dedication to graduate education in health administration.

Marilane Bond 2006 was appointed to the role of Associate Dean, Medical Education, effective February 1, 2015. In this new leadership capacity, Marilane will retain oversight of Graduate Medical Education (GME) along with expanded administrative and operational responsibility for the MD program, the MD/PhD program, Continuing Medical Education (CME) and the academic health professions programs. She will play an integral role in shaping the future of medical education within the School of Medicine.

Emory Healthcare appointed two new chief executive officers (CEOs) to oversee two of its top hospitals. Marilyn Margolis 2005 has been named CEO of Emory Johns Creek Hospital, and Dan Owens 2006 has been appointed CEO of Emory University Hospital Midtown. Marilyn had been serving as interim CEO, chief nursing officer (CNO) and vice president of operations at Emory Johns Creek Hospital and Dan had been serving as interim CEO and vice president of operations at Emory University Hospital Midtown.

In February, Lance Waller 2003 presented "Mapping Mysteries: Science Through Cartographic Visualization and Spatial Statistics" as part of Ursinus College's Center for Science and the Common Good speaker series.

Roxann Arnold 2007 was awarded the Achievement Award by the American Association of Healthcare Administrative Management. The award is in grateful appreciation of exemplary leadership and selfless acts of time and dedication to the healthcare community, while promoting teamwork sharing her vast knowledge and helping others reach new heights.

Mark Mulligan 2008 was named to a three-year term on the Research Committee of the Infectious Diseases Society of America (2014-17) as the representative from the HIV Medicine Association. He was also awarded the R. Wayne Alexander Excellence in Research Accomplishment Award for 2013-14. This is in recognition of his significant contributions to medical knowledge realized through a body of research over the breadth of a career, by the Emory University Department of Medicine.

Leonard Howell 2005 was elected president of the College on Problems of Drug Dependence (CPDD). The College is the longest standing group in the United States addressing problems of drug dependence and abuse. The organization serves as an interface among governmental, industrial and academic communities maintaining liaisons with regulatory and research agencies as well as educational, treatment, and prevention facilities in the drug abuse field.

Monica Farley 2009 was awarded the Founder's Medal at the Southern Society of Clinical Investigation (SSCI) Meeting in New Orleans on February 27th. This is the highest award that one can receive from this prestigious society and she is the second WLA alum in a row to win this award. Last year the Founder's Medal was awarded to **Jesse Roman 2003**, who left Emory in 2009 to become the Chairman of Medicine at the University of Louisville.



Kimberly Rask 2004 has been appointed to the Rural Health Expert Panel at the National Quality Forum and the Standing Workgroup for Quality Indicator Enhancement at the Agency for Healthcare Quality and Research.

Jason Stein 2010 leads a team of physicians, nurses, and engineers who have been awarded the Society of Hospital Medicine's 2015 Award for Excellence in Teamwork in Quality Improvement recognizing the team's export of an interdisciplinary, patient-centered hospital care model to over 50 hospital units in 14 U.S. states and Australia. The ACUTM Care Model and SIBRTM -- associated with reductions in in-hospital mortality, complications of care, length-of-stay, and variable costs -- was described in the peer-reviewed literature this year for the first time in the *Journal of Hospital Medicine* (**Stein JM** et al. Reorganizing a hospital ward as an Accountable Care Unit. *J Hosp Med.* 2015 Jan;10(1):36-40). Jason was recognized with the same award in 2010 for leading an EHC team that invented a real-time dashboard to improve provision of venous thromboembolism prophylaxis in the hospital.

Volkan Adsay 2012 will be taking on the position of the President-Elect of the prestigious United States and Canadian Academy of Pathology (USCAP), in April 2015. He is also the 2015 recipient of the Gastrointestinal Pathology Society's Jack Yardley Investigator Award.

Dian Evans 2011 was selected as Chair-Elect of the American Academy of Emergency Nurse Practitioners, promoted from Assistant to Associate Clinical Professor, and was inducted as a Fellow in the American Association of Nurse Practitioners.

The VHA Office of Academic Affiliations has selected the Cognitive Disorders Specialty Care Education Center of Excellence at the Atlanta VA Medical Center as a new site in its Patient-Centered Specialty Care in Education Centers of Excellence (SCE CoE) Initiative. The Atlanta VAMC will be funded \$500,000 each year for the next three years. **Anne Tomolo 2014** will be the Director and **Carolyn Clevenger 2013** will also be working on this program.

This SCE CoE, under the direction of Anne and Corrine Abraham, DNP, RN, will provide an interprofessional approach to the care of Veterans with cognitive disorders and incorporate the expertise of physicians, nurses, neuropsychologists, and social workers in the fields of Geriatrics, Neurology, Palliative Care and Mental Health to manage the clinical, functional, behavioral, and psychological aspects of these disorders. The goal of this three-year initiative is to foster transformation of clinical education and patient care by preparing graduates of health professional schools and programs to work in and lead patient centered interprofessional teams providing specialty care in the setting of coordinated longitudinal primary care.

His appointment is from Sept. 2014 to July 2018. Dr. Pastan was nominated to serve on ACOT, which has 20 voting members from across the country, by the National Kidney Foundation. He also continues to publish studies on the disparities in dialysis center patient's access to kidney transplantation in the Southeast.

General John F. Kelly visited Emory on March 4. Kelly is the Commander of the U.S. Southern Command, one of five four-star generals charged by the president to lead the Department of Defense security cooperation in designated segments of the world. Kelly oversees Central and South America and the Caribbean Sea (except U.S. commonwealths, territories, and possessions) — some 16 million square miles.



Kelly and his staff spent a full day at Emory, touring facilities that exhibit how Emory contributes to the global community and advances initiatives that relate to his areas of influence. Security, public health and public safety — the spread of Ebola affects them all, and Kelly keenly explored those issues when he toured the Emory University Hospital special isolation unit with infectious disease specialists Dr. **Aneesh Mehta 2015** and Dr. G. Marshall Lyon III.

The doctors briefed Kelly on the detailed process for doffing high-level personal protection equipment and the disposal of contaminated waste. Together, Kelly, his staff and the Emory doctors explored best practices for addressing a range of potential and problematic scenarios, including an Ebola outbreak in a Central or South American country and the corresponding mass migration to the U.S. that would inevitably follow.

"Women who develop heart disease at a younger age make up a special high-risk group because they are disproportionally vulnerable to emotional stress," said **Viola Vaccarino 2010**, M.D., Ph.D., study author and chairwoman of Cardiovascular Research and Epidemiology at Emory University's Rollins School of Public Health in Atlanta, Georgia.

ScienceNews | Shots of brain cells restore learning, memory in rats

The researchers directed human stem cells to become a type of brain cell that is destroyed by radiation, a common cancer treatment, then grafted the cells into the brains of irradiated rats. Within a few months, the rats' performance on learning and memory tests improved. "This technique, translated to humans, could be a major step forward for the treatment of radiation-induced brain ... injury," says **Jonathan Glass 2008**, a neurologist at Emory University in Atlanta.
