Accomplishments, Appointments, Awards...

Chris Larsen 2003, an internationally recognized leader in transplant surgery and immunology, has been named dean of Emory University School of Medicine. His roles also include VP for health center integration and chair of the board of directors of The Emory Clinic.

Tom Pearson 2004 was named the Executive Director of the Emory Transplant Center. He is also surgical director of the kidney and pancreas transplant program, Livingston Professor of Surgery, and an affiliate scientist at Yerkes Primate Research Center.

Heather Hamby 2006 was named associate VP for health center integration for the Woodruff Health Sciences Center as well as executive associate dean and chief operating officer for the School of Medicine. These appointments were effective Feb. 1.

In February **David Howard 2013** was appointed to the Medicare Evidence Development & Coverage Advisory Committee. The Committee makes recommendations to CMS about coverage policies for tests and therapies under the Medicare program.

Winship investigator **Ned Waller 2007** is the key author in NEJM study:

WINSHIP CENTRAL TO STEM CELL TRANSPLANT STUDY IN NEJM

ATLANTA -- Edmund K. Waller, MD, Director of the Bone Marrow and Stem Cell Transplantation Center at Winship Cancer Institute was a key author and researcher in a study that could influence whether leukemia and blood-related cancer patients receive transplants from blood stem cells or bone marrow.

The study, published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* on Oct. 18, reported on the first randomized trial comparing bone marrow with peripheral blood stem cells (PBSC) for unrelated-donor transplantation. The trial involved 48 centers enrolling 551 patients as part of the Bone Marrow and Clinical Trials Network (BMT CTN). Dr. Waller helped design the study, and his lab at Winship analyzed the cells in each type of graft as the central core lab for the trial.



The study found no significant difference in the overall survival rate at two years, and no difference in relapse rates or in acute graft-versus-host-disease (GVHD). It did, however, find a significantly higher rate of chronic GVHD with the use of blood stem cells.

Because GVHD can be a difficult and sometimes life-threatening complication from transplants, this finding could result in patients and their physicians choosing different treatments. At the very least, this finding will generate serious discussion among leaders in the transplant field about whether bone marrow or PBSC transplantation is a better treatment option.

"What is surprising," said Waller, "is that the relapse rate was similar, despite the PBSC arm having more chronic GVHD."

Chronic GVHD starts more than three months after a transplant and can severely diminish a patient's quality of life over his or her lifetime. Dr. Waller says the study leads him to believe that since the survival rates are the same, bone marrow should be the standard for the majority of unrelated-donor transplants. Exceptions to this would be patients with life-threatening infections and patients at high risk for graft rejection.

Donating bone marrow involves a two or three hour surgical procedure requiring general anesthesia, in which bone marrow is removed from the hip bone with a needle and syringe. For peripheral blood stem cells, the donor undergoes five days of injections of granulocyte colony-stimulating factor and then a four-hour apheresis procedure to harvest stem cells from the blood. Blood stem cell donors have bone pain during the 5-day period of cytokine treatment, and bone marrow donors have more discomfort early after donation, but symptoms for both BM and PBSC donors have typically resolved by four weeks after donation.

Winship played a key role in this study and, according to Waller, is part of on-going BMT CTN studies that will help shape transplant protocols and outcomes.

"This is an outstanding example of Winship investigators leading in the resolution of major questions in cancer care," said Fadlo R. Khuri, MD, Deputy Director of the Winship Cancer Institute, and Chair of the Department of Hematology and Medical Oncology at Emory University. "Dr. Waller and his colleagues have helped define a major question, namely, whether patients who receive grafts from unrelated donors should receive peripheral stem cells or cells from the bone marrow harvest of others. This is paradigm shifting work, and Dr. Waller and his colleagues are to be congratulated for their foresight and persistence in answering this important question."

Dr. Omar Lattouf, Emory Professor of Cardiothoracic Surgery, recently participated in the meeting of the American College of Cardiology (ACC) Cardiometabolic Work Group. Dr. Lattouf spoke with the Committee Chair, Emory Cardiology Professor Larry Sperling 2008, president - elect of the Society of Preventive Cardiology, who expressed an interest in collaborating with the group's CEO Roundtable Steering Committee to further advance our common objectives and particularly to explore ways to materialize the 2 proposals below:

1. Creating easy to apply, easy to introduce visual and reportable metrics to define, determine and to allow in seamless ways regular reporting of CMS status, risk and response to treatment and life-style modification. The use of CMS Bull's Eye, which is in the development stage, would serve well here.

2. The concept of "Immunizing" children against CMS! Dr. Lattouf uses the term immunizing in a metaphoric way to educate and "sensitize" children early in their lives, and help create a "mental awareness" against the CMS risk factors.

Additionally, Dr. Sperling informed him that the ACC is planning a multi-disciplinary meeting next year, likely to include the Association of Black Cardiologists, Endocrine Society and other important organizations.
