2018 WLA Fellow Receives TSRA Socrates Teaching Award

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"The Socrates Award is given annually by the TSRA to an outstanding faculty member in cardiothoracic surgery in recognition of his or her commitment to resident education and mentorship"

Each year, cardiothoracic surgery residents across North America nominate a faculty member to receive the Thoracic Surgery Residents' Association's Socrates Award for his or her remarkable commitment to resident education and mentorship. **Ed Chen** was formally presented with the award at the TSRA meeting on January 29, held during the 55th Annual Meeting of the Society of Thoracic Surgeons in San Diego.

The Socrates Award is given annually by the TSRA to an outstanding faculty member in cardiothoracic surgery in recognition of his or her commitment to resident education and mentorship. Each year, cardiothoracic surgery residents across North America nominate a faculty member for the award who has demonstrated a remarkable interest in resident training, both inside and outside the operating room.

Ed's position as a valued educator, clinician, author, and presenter is informed by his status as a national and international leader in aortic surgery known for performing highly complex cardiac operations. He is also widely acknowledged for his innovative work in circulation management and cerebral protection in aortic arch surgery as well as his command of thoracic aortic procedures, surgical treatment of valvular heart disease, and reoperative cardiac surgery.

Since joining Emory Surgery in 2004, Ed has mentored over 40 cardiothoracic surgery residents, who have adopted his surgical techniques in aortic surgery and valvular heart disease and introduced them into their own practices. He has also supervised numerous residents during their clinical research projects. Additionally, he has proctored various current and former Emory cardiothoracic surgery faculty members in minimally invasive valve procedures and mentored junior faculty on complex aortic surgical techniques.

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Nimalie Stone 2009 and her team at the CDC that focuses on infection prevention and resident safety in nursing homes and other long-term care settings, just released a comprehensive, free, training course on infection prevention and control for nursing home staff. Below is some information about the course that was shared through a large email blast to CDC partners. It was a massive undertaking, two years in the making, and the first training for providers that the agency has developed for nursing homes. There are over 15,000 nursing homes in the US and the complexity of care in these facilities has been increasing for over a decade. The infrastructure and training needs to support infection prevention in this setting has lagged behind acute care hospitals for a long time and they are very proud of this contribution to supporting safer care in this setting.

The course provides 19.5 CME hours (for everyone who needs to renew their GA medical license). You only have to pass a simple 75 question post-course exam!

Take new online training course in infection prevention and control for nursing home staff with Free CE

CDC, in collaboration with the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), just launched a new Nursing Home Infection Preventionist Training course. This specialized nursing home training is designed for individuals responsible for infection prevention and control (IPC) programs in nursing homes. The course covers:

- Core activities of effective IPC programs,
- Recommended IPC practices to reduce:
 - Pathogen transmission
 - Healthcare-associated infections
 - o Antibiotic resistance

The course introduces and describes how to use IPC program implementation resources including policy and procedure templates, audit tools, and outbreak investigation tools.

The course is made up of 23 modules and sub-modules that can be completed in any order and over multiple sessions. Free CME, CNE or CEUs available upon completion of the course.
