<u>Accomplishments, Appointments, Awards...</u>

Vinod Thourani 2011 won the Richard Clark award at the Society of Thoracic Surgeons (STS) national meeting in January. He was also elected to the board of directors for the STS as well as the board of directors for the Heart Valve Society.

Yoko Hammond 2011 was selected for the 2015 Emory University Award of Distinction. Each year, the Award of Distinction Program recognizes approximately 10-15 university employees who have made outstanding contributions to the Emory Community.

In February, Lisa Carlson 2013 received the Outstanding Teaching and Mentoring Adjunct Faculty Award from the Rollins School of Public Health.

In April, Lisa accepted a new role at Emory. She transitioned out of Surgery, Transplant and Brain Health into the role of Associate Director of Management and Operations with the new CHAMPS Network at the Emory Global Health Institute. Tawanda had been serving as the Vice President of Patient Care Services and CNO at Southern Regional Medical Center, an Emory Healthcare Network Partner, since May 2013.

He warned not to leap to large-scale causes until they really look into data and figure out what they have in those cases.

Decatur resident Anita Corbett donates \$5,000 in Emory prize money



Anita Corbett, a professor of biochemistry at the Emory School of Medicine, was recently honored by the Laney Graduate School of Emory University with the inaugural Eleanor Main Graduate Mentor Award. Prof. Corbett said the news of her selection for the faculty award was a surprise. "I am most humbled to be selected for this award. The typical reward for mentoring is seeing trainees

prosper. Anyone who is a committed mentor typically gains satisfaction from the success of others," she says. "For me, this is sufficient to make me feel as though my efforts are appreciated. However, the formal award indicating the appreciation of colleagues, friends and trainees is an outstanding validation that the time and effort dedicated makes a difference."

The award honors the memory of the late Dr. Eleanor C. Main, herself an Emory professor who served in several high-ranking administrative positions in her four decades of service and leadership at Emory University. She was a passionate advocate and mentor for her students and colleagues and for young women in the greater Atlanta community.

The award includes a \$5,000 cash prize, which Anita donated to the Decatur Education Foundation. She made the gift in May and said she hoped to set a precedent and inspire future honorees to consider donating their prizes.

Anita has been an active member of the City Schools of Decatur community. She served as a member of the School Leadership Team at Clairemont and was a member of the PTA at both Clairemont and the 4/5 Academy at 5th Avenue. She organized and ran the Science Explorers' Club at Clairemont for many years. Anita has three children who attend City Schools of Decatur - Maya Karkare who will be a sophomore at Decatur High School, Sonia Karkare who will be a freshman at Decatur High School and Nicky Karkare who will be a 6th grader at Renfroe Middle School.

Anita has also been selected to serve as a faculty mentor under a national program through the American Society for Cell Biology (ASCB) aimed at promoting diversity in science. She will be mentoring Dr. Nathan Bowen at Clark Atlanta University.

Under the program, a limited number of young scientists are selected to work with more-experienced, funded senior faculty at a research-intensive institution for a long-term structured mentoring relationship. This relationship focuses on preparation of a research or educational grant to be submitted to the National Science Foundation or comparable funding agency.

The ASCB mentoring program is focused on newly independent investigators who are senior postdoctoral scientists about to launch their own independent positions or untenured junior faculty members who have been in their current positions for no more than five years. Minority professors and professors at colleges and universities with a high minority enrollment especially are encouraged to apply for the program, according to the ASCB.
