

A Report on Woodruff Leadership Academy Fellows

The Department of Medicine announced that it has chosen Jada Bussey-Jones 2014, as the new Vice Chair of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. In addition, Kimberly Manning 2011 will serve as the department's Associate Vice Chair of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Together, Jada and Kimberly will provide vision and leadership in promoting a departmental culture that values these attributes.

The Emory School of Medicine Recognitions Committee sent out a call for nominations for educators across the SOM who go above and beyond the call of duty as teachers and mentors. The committee reviewed outstanding nominations from peers, colleagues, and trainees.

As a result, these four WLA Fellows were recognized as part of this year's Educator Appreciation Day. Mary Jo Lechowicz 2011 received the Exemplary Teacher/Scholar award for the entire Emory University, at the main graduation for the Class of 2019.

Also, earlier this month, Mary Jo visited Tbilisi State Medical University to speak and attend the inaugural graduation of the TSMU American Program's graduation of their first class to complete the six-year program. She has been working on creating the entire medical school curriculum for the last seven years, in conjunction with the faculty of TSMU and Drs. Gordon Churchward, Archil Undilashvili, and the late H. Kenneth Walker, as the consulting team on the Emory side. Mary Jo said this has been a wonderful collaboration and we look forward to ongoing relationship with TSMU.

Mi-Kyung Song 2017 received the Distinguished Researcher Award from the Southern Nursing Research Society. She was also inducted into the Sigma Theta Tau International Nurse Researchers Hall of Fame for her work in palliative and end-of-life care.

Winship and collaborators from five other institutions have received a UG1 grant from the National Cancer Institute that will help fund translational research in thoracic malignancies. Suresh Ramalingam 2017 is the contact principal investigator for the award. Taofeek Owonikoko 2018 and Shi-Yong Sun will serve as co-investigators.

Lucky Jain 2003 has been appointed as the Dr. George W. Brumley, Jr. Chair in Pediatrics.

The staff of Emory Johns Creek Hospital's radiology department recently had cause for celebration, as the facility was designated as the state's only American College of Radiology Diagnostic Imaging Center of Excellence.

Hannah Henry 2019, Emory Johns Creek Hospital's vice president of operations, said it was an honor and credited the people who work there. "We're very proud of the hard work demonstrated by our radiology staff to receive this incredible designation," Hannah said. "Our team had to undergo a comprehensive assessment of the entire medical imaging practice, to include structure and outcomes, professional staff, technology, policies and procedures, image quality, safety, and patient results."

Gateway for Cancer Research, a nonprofit dedicated to funding transformational cancer research, has approved a \$1.5 million grant to help physician scientists at Phoenix Children's Hospital make progress in combating one of the most devastating, aggressive pediatric brain tumors, called Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma (DIPG).

Led by Cynthia Wetmore 2017, the Division Chief of Hematology/Oncology and Director of the Center for Cancer and Blood Disorders at Phoenix Children's, the study, called CUPID, will test a therapy combining a customized peptide vaccine with a checkpoint inhibitor to combat the incurable pediatric brain stem cancer, DIPG. This is a collaboration with Stephen Johnston, PhD at Arizona State University, who has developed the technology for identifying peptides for the vaccine. If ultimately successful, the research could be the first therapeutic progress for DIPG in over 30 years.

The University of Alabama at Birmingham has named Andrew Butler 2011 dean of the UAB School of Health Professions following a national search. He joins UAB from the Byrdine F. Lewis College of Nursing and Health Professions at Georgia State University, where he is professor of physical therapy and associate dean for Research. Andrew will start on July 1st.

Suresh Ramalingam 2017 was named a Fellow of the American Society of Clinical Oncology (FASCO) at a ceremony held June 1 during ASCO's annual meeting in Chicago. The distinction recognizes global oncology leaders who have demonstrated extraordinary volunteer service, dedication, and commitment to the society.

Kristin Higgins 2019 will be awarded one of 10 nationwide Cancer Clinical Investigator Team Leadership Awards by the National Cancer Institute in July. It includes 15% effort for 2 years funded through the NCI. Kristin is also the overall principal investigator of a new NRG Oncology study enrolling through the National Clinical Trial Network (NCTN). It is the first National Cancer Institute-supported phase III trial of immunotherapy for patients with limited stage small cell lung cancer.

Ned Waller 2007, Carlos Moreno, and Mark Goodman are the recipients of Emory School of Medicine's 13 Venture Research Awards, which support promising early-stage concepts with commercial potential.

Donald Harvey 2019 has been promoted to Professor of Hematology and Medical Oncology, effective September 1.

Viraj Master 2014 has been named Winship Director of Integrative Oncology and Survivorship. In this new role, he will collaboratively develop and implement a vision for innovative programs in translational research, quality, patient safety, and cancer care delivery at Winship.
