2013 WLA Fellow Named President-Elect of APHA

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"APHA is the largest, oldest, and most diverse organization of public health professionals in the world" Lisa Carlson, affiliated instructor at the Emory Rollins School of Public Health, and executive administrator of research programs and operations at the Emory School of Medicine, was named president-elect of the American Public Health Association (APHA) in November. Her election was announced during APHA's annual meeting in San Diego. APHA is the largest, oldest, and most diverse organization of public health professionals in the world.

Lisa has spent more than 25 years working in public health and medicine. At Rollins (where she received her MPH), she is an affiliated instructor in the Executive MPH program. As of March 19, 2018, Lisa is also the executive administrator of research programs and operations at the Emory School of Medicine. In this role, she works alongside School of Medicine leaders to develop and implement key research initiatives.

She has served in a leadership capacity at Emory University for almost 17 years. Among her many contributions to Emory during this period include "facilitating annual funding growth in transplant research from \$8.1 million to \$29 million and launching the largest sponsored award ever received at Emory (\$78 million), leading the establishment of six international childhood mortality surveillance sites."

Throughout the course of her career, Lisa has been actively involved with APHA and has taken on a number of public health-related leadership roles. More than 25 years ago, she joined Georgia Public Health Association (the Georgia affiliate of APHA) and was later elected as that organization's youngest ever president. In the past, she has also served as chair of APHA's executive board.

As president-elect, Lisa hopes to build both internal and external relationships, expand APHA's influence, strengthen the role of affiliates, and strengthen APHA's impact on public health.
