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ounded in 1966, the Woodruff Health Sciences Center is named for the legendary leader of The Coca-Cola Company, Robert W. Woodruff. It includes three schools, a national primate research center, a cancer institute, five research and educational units, and the most comprehensive health care system in Georgia. The center is a component of Emory University (see below), and many of its facilities are located on Emory's main campus, five miles east of downtown Atlanta. The center also has clinical facilities throughout metro Atlanta and the state.

## **Emory University School of Medicine** (founded 1854)

Emory University School of Medicine has 3,599 full- and part-time faculty and 994 volunteer faculty. The school had 12,881 applications in 2023 for 141 first-year medical student positions. This MD class is composed of 71.2% women and 21.6% underrepresented minorities, and 89% of the class members are nontraditional (they were out of college for at least a year before entering medical school). In 2023, the pass rate for first-time takers of step 1 of the National Board Exam (testing basic science knowledge and skills) was 91%. The school has 605 medical students and trains 1,414 residents and fellows in 118 accredited programs. It has 90 MD/PhD students, with 22 of those funded through NIH training grant lines. Some of these students are in a joint program with Georgia Tech, with which the medical school shares a biomedical engineering department ranked #1 in the country by U.S. News & World Report. The medical school also offers a joint MD/MSCR (master's in clinical research) degree, an MD/MPH degree with the Rollins School of Public Health, and an MD/MA in bioethics with the Laney Graduate School. Dual programs with law (juris master) and business (MBA) are also available. One hundred and forty seven medical faculty train predoctoral

bioscience researchers in eight programs in the Graduate Division of Biological and Biomedical Sciences in Emory's Laney Graduate School. Faculty in five allied health programs train 493 students. These include physician assistant and physical therapy programs ranked #5 and #8 respectively in the nation by U.S. News & World Report. The allied health programs also include the anesthesiologist assistant program, genetic counseling training program, and medical imaging program. Under-represented minorities represent 29.7% of all programs at the school. Medical school faculty received \$386.6 million in sponsored research funding from the NIH in FY 2023. Ranked #17 nationally in NIH dollars received, the NIH awarded the school 22 training grant lines for MD/PhD students. The school is best known for its work in infectious disease, brain health, heart disease, cancer, transplantation, orthopaedics, pediatrics, renal disease, ophthalmology, and geriatrics. Physician faculty in Emory's own and affiliate teaching hospitals and outpatient venues were responsible for 6.3 million patient service visits in FY 2023. Alumni totals: 6,445 medical school, 13,390 residency/fellowship, 7,293 allied health, including 1,727 physical therapy and 2,130 physician assistant program alumni. In addition, 7,050 physicians and other healthcare professionals participated in continuing medical education classes offered by Emory in FY 2023.

### **Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing (founded 1905)**

The Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing is among the nation's top nursing schools, with its master's degree programs ranking #1 nationally by *U.S. News & World Report* and its BSN and DNP programs ranking #3 and #6, respectively. The school has also been named a Center of Excellence by the National League for Nursing.

The school has 33 PhD, 206 Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP), 347 Master of Science in Nursing (MSN), 10 Master of Cardiovascular Perfusion Science, and 777 pre-licensure Bachelor of Science (BSN) and Master of Nursing (MN) students. The school's enrollment has grown 38% over the past five years in response to the critical need for nursing leaders. Graduates become national and international leaders in patient care, public health, government, research, and education. In addition to the traditional BSN program, the school offers an accelerated BSN program for distance learners, and its MN Pathway to MSN program provides a fast track to becoming an advanced practice nurse.

The school's MSN, DNP, and post-graduate certificate programs include specialties in adult/gerontology, nurse anesthesia, nurse midwifery, pediatrics, psychiatric mental health, women's/gender-related studies, and emergency, family, and neonatal care. Students can combine knowledge across disciplines through dual degree options in bioethics and public health. The school recently launched a cardiovascular perfusion science program and a data science certificate program to meet critical needs in both nursing and health care.

The school's PhD program has research strengths in aging studies, artificial intelligence/data science, cardiovascular disease, global health, HIV/AIDS, maternal-child health, natural disasters/environmental and climate science, oncology, palliative care, social determinants of health, symptom science/sleep,

translational science/neuroscience, and women's health. In FY 2023, the school received \$32.3 million in research funding. The school's total research funding grew 253% over the past five years, and the school is #5 among all nursing schools in NIH research funding.

The school has 124 full-time and 10 part-time ranked faculty, 41 full-time and 270 part-time instructors, 153 full-time and 6 part-time staff, and 6 full-time and 13 part-time temporary staff. Offering both international and domestic immersion experiences for students, the school engages in robust research and service projects alongside underserved populations in Atlanta, other parts of Georgia, and the Southeastern U.S. The school has 10,616 graduates around the world.

## Rollins School of Public Health (founded 1990)

The Rollins School of Public Health has 1,044 master's degree students and 218 PhD students who choose from degrees in behavioral, social, and health education sciences; biostatistics and bioinformatics; epidemiology; environmental health sciences; health care management, health policy, and health services research; global health and development; and nutrition and health sciences.

An interdisciplinary studies leader, the school offers dual-degree programs with the programs in medicine, nursing, physician assistant, physical therapy, business, theology, law, and the graduate school. A distance-based master's program, the Executive MPH, allows professionals to pursue a degree while employed.

The school ranks #5 nationally among schools of public health in NIH funding, receiving more than \$62 million in FY 2023. Total research funding for the school was \$179 million. These funds support efforts in cancer prevention, cardiovascular epidemiology, nutrition, climate change, substance abuse disorders, environmental health, HIV/AIDS, maternal and child health, social determinants of health, safe water, tobacco control, mental health, addictive behaviors, injury and violence, antibiotic resistance, diabetes and obesity, and health services.

Many of the over 220 full- and part-time faculty and 275 adjunct faculty in six academic departments are linked by appointments, shared programs, or research grants with CDC, The Carter Center, American Cancer Society, CARE, Arthritis Foundation, Task Force for Global Health, and state and local public health agencies. Through these partnerships and as a center for international health research and training, the school helps make Atlanta a worldwide destination for public health. It is ranked #3 among peer institutions by *U.S. News & World Report* and has 12,194 alumni.

## **Emory Global Diabetes Research Center** (founded 2006)

The Emory Global Diabetes Research Center (EGDRC) develops and advances the abilities of Emory, U.S., and non-U.S. researchers to engage in world-class research in diabetes and other related noncommunicable diseases such as stroke, hypertension, heart disease, and co-morbid conditions such as tuberculosis, mental health, and HIV. EGDRC aims to improve the lives of people and populations through interdisciplinary diabetes research.

### Emory Global Health Institute (EGHI) (founded 2006)

The Emory Global Health Institute (EGHI) works at the intersection of education, research, and practice to achieve global health impact. Since its founding in 2006, more than 5,500 Emory students and 450 faculty from across 57 departments and nine schools have participated in EGHI experiential and innovative programs. EGHI faculty and partners have co-authored more than 1,600 publications and hosted more than 3,530 lectures to convene stakeholders around critical issues and advance global health.

EGHI funds Emory faculty research and has awarded more than \$8 million to bring Emory eminence to some of the most pressing challenges facing the world, including climate change; maternal and child health; emergency preparedness and response; and addressing the highest burden chronic and infectious diseases in underserved communities.

Awarded nearly \$32 million in grants in FY 2023, EGHI staff and faculty work to advance global health equity through its programs and research, including the International Association of National Public Health Institutes (IANPHI), which strengthens national public health institutes worldwide; the Child Health and Mortality Prevention Surveillance (CHAMPS) network, which provides evidence on under-five child mortality to inform data-driven action to save young lives in high-burden areas; and Treatment Research & Expert Education (TREE), which develops local knowledge, skills, and expertise to improve health outcomes for women and empower communities in East Africa.

## **Emory National Primate Research Center** (founded 1930)

The Emory NPRC has 382 staff members, 43 faculty scientists, 37 faculty in residence, and 48 postdoctoral fellows, and serves as the training ground for 134 undergraduate and graduate students. The center's research is grounded in scientific integrity; expert knowledge; respect for colleagues; commitment to diversity; an open exchange of ideas; and compassionate, quality animal care. Supported by more than \$90 million in research funding in FY 2023, Emory NPRC researchers are making discoveries in microbiology and immunology;

neurologic diseases; neuropharmacology; behavioral, cognitive, and developmental neuroscience; and psychiatric disorders. The center advances vaccine development for infectious and noninfectious diseases, paves the way for earlier diagnosis of and new treatments for illnesses such as Alzheimer's and Parkinson's, defines the neurobiology and genetics of social behavior to support new therapies for autism spectrum and other disorders as well as drug addiction, and teaches us how interactions between genetics and environment shape who we are.

## Goizueta Institute @ Emory Brain Health (founded 2021)

Led by Emory's world-class brain health clinical and research teams, the Goizueta Institute @ Emory Brain Health leverages the power of large-scale data collection and analysis with patients and the health care community to predict, prevent, and treat brain disease. The institute examines how biological, medical, and lifestyle factors impact brain health and disease and promotes new research approaches to improve patient care and prevent common brain diseases.

The WHSC Office of Interprofessional Education & Collaborative Practice (IPECP) supports and develops innovative interprofessional educational and research opportunities for faculty, students, and trainees at Emory University's three health professional schools. Its mission is to transform health care and public health through interprofessional education, research, and active engagement in the communities that the WHSC serves.

#### WHSC Office of Well-Being—EmWELL (founded 2022)

The WHSC Office of Well-Being (EmWELL) creates, enhances, supports, and studies innovative well-being initiatives for clinicians, health professionals, faculty, and other team members. These include projects around interventions, education, research, and advocacy. EmWELL partners closely with other teams in the WHSC including operational leaders, human resources, DEI leaders, campus life, and entity-specific programs.

## Winship Cancer Institute (founded 1937)

As the only National Cancer Institute (NCI)–Designated Comprehensive Cancer Center for the state of Georgia and one of only 56 in the country, the Winship Cancer Institute of Emory University discovers, develops, delivers, and teaches novel and highly effective approaches to cancer prevention, detection, diagnosis, treatment, and survivorship.

Winship has more than 580 faculty members conducting cancer research; they received \$67.4 million in cancer research funding, with \$28.6 million from the NCI. Faculty include investigators from various units across Emory, Georgia Tech, and regional partner institutions. Winship researchers are supported by numerous national team science grants that focus on high-priority cancers impacting Georgians, and they have the distinction of holding both an NCI Specialized Program of Research Excellence grant and an NCI Po1 program project grant in lung cancer.

Winship physicians provide comprehensive, advanced cancer care at eight Emory Healthcare locations and three affiliated sites. Winship serves more than 17,000 new patients every year and one-fifth of Georgia patients with a new diagnosis of cancer. In 2022, Winship opened the Rollins Immediate Care Center, the first center in Georgia to provide acute care for patients experiencing cancer-related symptoms that require immediate medical attention. In May 2023, Winship opened a 17-story, full-service inpatient and outpatient cancer care center, Winship at Emory Midtown, that delivers a unique model of personalized cancer care. Winship provides the only proton therapy in Georgia at the Emory Proton Therapy Center, and Winship is home to the oldest and largest bone marrow and stem cell therapy center in Georgia. In addition to transforming cancer care delivery, Winship works to better predict and prevent cancer as well as to provide survivorship support services such as integrated complementary therapies.

More than 930 patients enrolled in 640 interventional clinical trials at Winship in 2023. It has the largest unit in Georgia for Phase I clinical trials—a critical first step for introducing new therapies against cancer. Winship is one of 30 inaugural U.S. cancer centers selected as a Lead Academic Participating Site for the NCI National Clinical Trials Network, NCI's primary infrastructure to conduct Phase I and II clinical trials. Winship also serves patients through the Winship Cancer Network, a partnership with community hospitals enhancing access to research and treatment (see page 8).

Through its Office of Community Outreach and Engagement, Winship facilitates research and disseminates evidence-based interventions in Georgia with the goal of reducing health disparities and the cancer burden across the state. Winship also provides comprehensive, cancer-focused training and education opportunities across the continuum of learners, starting in middle school and spanning undergraduate, graduate, postdoctoral, and career-development programs.

## Emory Regional Affiliate Network ("EA" in map at right)

The Emory Regional Affiliate Network extends Emory's clinical expertise and knowledge to systems across Georgia and the nearby Southeast. The 6 Network Associates and 1 Emory Healthcare joint venture hospital collaborate with Emory on initiatives aimed to keep care local by growing clinical services capacities and competencies. Additionally, Network Associates gain priority access to Emory's highly specialized tertiary and quarternary inpatient and outpatient services. The Network Associates have locations in 9 counties.


#### Winship Cancer Network ("W" in the map at right)

## IN ATLANTA AND ACROSS THE STATE



Emory Healthcare (EHC) is the most comprehensive academic health system in Georgia, with \$5.8 billion in net revenue in FY 2023. System-wide, it has 2,811 licensed patient beds, 23,988 employees, and more than 3,730 physicians practicing in more than 70 specialties. Annual hospital admissions totaled 101,444 and outpatient service visits 6.32 million, while EHC clinicians saw 772,822 individual patients. Providing a \$579.4 million community benefit, EHC serves metro Atlanta and the state with over 525 locations. The system's 11 hospitals include Emory University Hospital, Emory University Hospital Midtown, Emory University Orthopaedics & Spine Hospital, Emory Smyrna Hospital, Emory University Hospital at Wesley Woods, Emory Decatur Hospital, Emory Hillandale Hospital, Emory Johns Creek Hospital, Emory Long-Term Acute Care, Emory Rehabilitation Hospital, and Emory Saint Joseph's Hospital. It also provides services to greater Georgia through a joint venture at St. Francis-Emory Healthcare Hospital in Columbus. Other components of the EHC system include the Emory Clinic, Emory Specialty Associates, 6 Network Associates, and the Emory Healthcare Network. In addition to the EHC clinical locations listed on page 8, EHC Network partners with MinuteClinic and urgent care providers (Peachtree Immediate Care) throughout metro Atlanta.

## **Emory University Hospital** (founded 1904)

An adult, tertiary/quaternary care facility, Emory University Hospital (EUH) has 751 licensed beds. Staffed by 1,922 Emory faculty physicians, EUH includes 159 ICU beds and a Serious Communicable Diseases Unit where ongoing research, training, and preparedness for challenging infectious diseases continue since the first patients with Ebola virus disease in the U.S. were treated there in 2014. Patients in FY 2023: 24,344 inpatient admissions and 224,378 outpatient service visits. Staff employees: 4,499. EUH is known for transplantation, cardiology, cardiac surgery, oncology, neurology/neurosurgery, and orthopaedics. It is a Magnet hospital, a designation earned by U.S. hospitals for nursing excellence from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. EUH has one of the highest case-mix indexes (a measure of complexity of illness treated) of any U.S. hospital. In 2024, for the 13th year in a row, U.S. News & World Report ranked the EUH the #1 hospital in metro Atlanta and Georgia. The 2024–2025 Best Hospitals Specialty Rankings ranked EUH nationally in the following adult specialties: geriatrics, neurology & neurosurgery, and urology.

## Emory University Hospital Midtown (founded 1908)

A tertiary academic teaching and care facility, Emory University Hospital Midtown (EUHM) has 605 licensed beds and is staffed by 1,844 Emory faculty physicians, and 290 private practice physicians. EUHM has 70 ICU beds, in addition to a level III neonatal intensive care unit with 48 beds. In May 2023, Winship Emory Midtown opened a full-service inpatient and outpatient cancer care center with 80 inpatient beds that delivers a unique model of personalized cancer care. Patients in FY 2023: 25,744 admissions (including 4,870 deliveries) and 403,884 outpatient service visits. Staff employees: 4,143. EUHM has a high case-mix index and is well known for services in cardiology, cardiac surgery, gastroenterology, neurosurgery, cancer, spine surgery, and otolaryngology/ head and neck cancer. It has an accredited Bariatric Surgery Program and Primary Stroke Center. Women's services include pre- and postnatal education, bone density testing, mammography, and obstetrics, as well as high-risk pregnancy. The U.S. News & World Report ranked EUHM as the #9 hospital in Georgia and the #8 hospital in metro Atlanta in its 2024-2025 Best Regional Hospitals rankings.

## **Emory University Orthopaedics & Spine Hospital** (founded 2007)

Emory University Orthopaedics & Spine Hospital has 120 licensed beds and nine ORs and is staffed by Emory faculty physicians. It has ranked in the top 10% of hospitals in the country for 15 years in patient satisfaction. It is a Magnet hospital, a designation earned by U.S. hospitals for nursing excellence from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. Patients in FY 2023: 1,727 admissions. Staff employees: 285.

Through an ongoing partnership, Morehouse School of Medicine physicians also see patients at Emory Decatur Hospital. Patients in FY 2023: 16,672 (including 3,100 deliveries) admissions and 148,205 outpatient service visits. Services include emergency medicine, cancer care, heart and vascular care, stroke care, maternity care, palliative care, podiatry, a weight loss center, a medical fitness center, and adult psychiatric and behavioral health services. Staff employees: 2,306.

Emory Hillandale Hospital has 100 beds and is staffed by 500 Emory faculty physicians, 238 private practice physicians, and 145 Emory Specialty Associate physicians. Through an ongoing partnership, Morehouse School of Medicine

physicians also see patients at Emory Hillandale Hospital. Patients in FY 2023: 5,008 admissions and 84,391 outpatient service visits. In addition to emergency medicine, breast care, and sleep medicine services, the hospital has specialty expertise in areas ranging from orthopaedics and rehabilitation to cardiology, endocrinology, diabetes, and nutrition. Staff employees: 655.

## **Emory Johns Creek Hospital** (founded 2007)

Emory Johns Creek Hospital (EJCH) is a 144-bed acute-care facility staffed by 660 Emory faculty physicians, 481 private practice physicians, and 74 Emory Specialty Associate physicians. As a full-service hospital, key services include emergency medicine, a women's center with level III neonatal intensive care, adult intensive care, an infusion center, breast imaging with 3-D tomography, a certified bariatric center, advanced cardiac and stroke care, orthopaedics, sleep medicine, wound care, urology, and a pain center. EJCH is a Magnet hospital, a designation earned by U.S. hospitals for nursing excellence from the American Nurses Credentialing Center. In 2024, *U.S. News & World Report* ranked EJCH the #8 hospital in Georgia and the #7 hospital in metro Atlanta. Patients in FY 2023: 9,782 admissions (including 1,496 deliveries) and 89,467 outpatient service visits. Staff employees: 1,311. EJCH partners with community organizations to offer health and wellness screenings and educational events throughout the year.

## **Emory Long-Term Acute Care** (founded 1997)

Emory Long-Term Acute Care is a 76-bed facility with 327 Emory faculty physicians, 97 private practice physicians, and 64 Emory Specialty Associate physicians. Patients in FY 2023: 324 admissions. The hospital specializes in pulmonary rehabilitation, including ventilator weaning, as well as general rehabilitation, physical therapy, and wound care. Staff employees: 182.

#### Emory Saint Joseph's Hospital (founded 1880)

Emory Saint Joseph's Hospital (ESJH) was established in 1880 as Atlanta's first hospital. Today, it is a 410-bed adult acute-care facility that is recognized as one of the top specialty-referral hospitals in the Southeast. ESJH trains physicians from around the world in robotic surgery for valve repair and is noted for cardiac, cancer, neurologic, vascular, gastrointestinal, respiratory, and orthopaedic care. It has 816 Emory faculty physicians, 277 private practice physicians, 282 Kaiser Permanente physicians, and eight Emory Specialty Associate physicians. ESJH was the third hospital in the world to achieve the prestigious American Nurses Credentialing Center Magnet designation and in 2023 earned its seventh-straight Magnet designation for nursing excellence and became the first hospital in the world to be designated Magnet with Distinction. In 2024, U.S. News & World Report

ranked ESJH the #2 hospital in Georgia and metro Atlanta. Patients in FY 2023: 16,817 admissions and 120,591 outpatient service visits. Staff employees: 2,228. Community services include a faith community nursing program, free health screenings and in-kind donations to organizations supporting the homeless and indigent.

## **Emory Rehabilitation Hospital** (founded 1976)

Emory Rehabilitation Hospital (ERH) has 66 licensed inpatient rehabilitation beds and is staffed by 110 Emory faculty physicians. It is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) and offers services in two CARF specialties: stroke and brain injury. Part of a joint venture with Select Medical, it includes 28 outpatient rehabilitation facilities. Specializing in stroke, ERH is one of the nation's highest acuity rehabilitation hospitals and was ranked #26 out of 1,085 rehabilitation hospitals in the 2021–2022 U.S. News & World Report. Patients in FY 2023: 1,026 admissions and 176,429 outpatient service visits. Emory Rehabilitation Joint Venture employees: 375.

## **Emory Clinic** (founded 1953)

The largest, most comprehensive group practice in Georgia, Emory Clinic has 2,280 Emory faculty physicians, 536 nurse practitioners, and 518 physician assistants, with locations throughout the city and state. Nonphysician employees: 3,799. Patient encounters in FY 2023: 5,076,232 including those for Emory Specialty Associates.

#### **Emory Specialty Associates** (founded 2006)

In addition to the Emory Clinic, Emory Healthcare provides outpatient care via Emory Specialty Associates (ESA), an Emory-owned physician practice organization with locations in 10 Georgia counties. ESA has 282 nonfaculty physicians, 54 nurse practitioners, and 137 physician assistants. Employees: 714.

## **Emory Healthcare Network** (founded 2011)

The Emory Healthcare Network is a clinically integrated network that provides access to coordinated patient-and family-centered care. With 11 hospitals, more than 525 provider locations, and over 3,700 physicians in more than 70 specialties, the Network delivers care through a full range of hospitals, clinics and local practices, including more than 500 primary care physicians, and over 40 Peachtree Immediate Care locations. The network spans not just the metro Atlanta area but the entire state. It is designed around common measures and goals so that patients receive the same quality of care wherever they go.

It coordinates care across the network so that patients are covered no matter where they seek care.

## **Woodruff Health Sciences Center Hospital Affiliates**

- The Atlanta VA Health Care System (VAHCS) is part of the VA Southeast Network, VISN 7. In FY 2023, 304 Emory faculty physicians practiced at the VAHCS, the largest tertiary VA facility in Georgia, with 22 sites of care. It provides highly specialized care for veterans, including open heart surgery and cancer therapies. The tertiary medical facility is a Level 1A facility with a total of 363 authorized beds that include 133 internal medicine beds, 78 community living center beds, 88 psychiatry beds, 52 surgery beds, and 12 compensated work therapy beds.
- Children's Healthcare of Atlanta
  - Children's at Egleston, 330 beds (Emory campus). Annual patient totals: 11,607 admissions and 327,279 outpatient service visits. Emory clinicians provide over 90% of care.

- Children's at Hughes Spalding, 24 beds (Grady Hospital campus). Annual patient totals: 997 admissions and 88,976 outpatient service visits. Staffed by 81 Emory physicians and by private practice physicians, with Emory clinicians providing more than 75% of care.
- Children's at Scottish Rite, 319 beds (north Atlanta). Annual patient totals: 15,722 admissions and 380,643 outpatient service visits; all Emory pediatric physician faculty have admitting privileges.
- Grady Memorial Hospital, 953 licensed beds. Annual patient service visits: 30,848 admissions, 628,143 outpatient visits, and 113,741 emergency room visits. Staffed by 877 Emory physician faculty and 149 advanced practice providers; in addition, 413 Emory residents and fellows provide care at Grady under supervision of the faculty. Together, these Emory physicians provide about 80% of care at Grady, with the other 20% provided by Morehouse School of Medicine and Grady-employed physicians.

## Additional Partners in Patient Care, Research, and Teaching

- Georgia Clinical & Translational Science Alliance (Georgia CTSA)
   Emory is the lead partner in the Georgia CTSA, an NIH-funded consortium created to translate laboratory discoveries into treatments for patients, engage communities in clinical research efforts, and train clinical investigators.
- Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

  Emory and the CDC have a number of research contracts and consulting partnerships. Emory University Hospital's Serious Communicable Diseases Unit, where the first patients in the U.S. with Ebola virus disease were treated, was built in collaboration with the CDC. Emory faculty serve as advisors on public health committees throughout the CDC, and CDC officers frequently serve as adjunct faculty in Emory's schools of public health and medicine.
- Georgia Center for Oncology Research and Education (Georgia CORE) Winship Cancer Institute works with Georgia CORE to partner with community-based physicians to make more clinical trials of new cancer treatments available to patients throughout the state.
- Georgia Institute of Technology

Emory and Georgia Tech share a joint biomedical engineering department ranked #1 in the nation by *U.S. News & World Report*. They also collaborate in nanotechnology, vaccine delivery, clean air and water, health services research, regenerative medicine, bioinformatics, neurosciences, pediatrics, medical devices, immunoengineering, robotics, and design of "smart" equipment and facilities to help the elderly and disabled.

## • Georgia Research Alliance (GRA)

The GRA is a partnership of business, research universities, and state government established to build a technology-driven economy fueled by breakthrough university research. Through it, the state invests in Emory eminent scholars and research in nanotechnology, cancer, pediatrics, new drug screenings, vaccines, AIDS and other infectious diseases, immunology,

transplantation, clinical trials, bioinformatics, autism, imaging, cystic fibrosis, addiction, obesity, and Alzheimer's disease.

#### • Morehouse School of Medicine

Emory's School of Medicine partners with Morehouse in serving patients at Grady Memorial Hospital (see page 15) and in training Morehouse residents. The two schools also partner in research through the Georgia CTSA (see page 15) and other research initiatives. Morehouse School of Medicine physicians also see patients at Emory Decatur Hospital and Emory Hillandale Hospital.

## • University of Georgia (UGA)

The schools collaborate in the NIH-sponsored Emory-UGA Center of Excellence for Influenza Research, a national network to improve pandemic preparedness. Emory, Georgia Tech, and UGA are partners in the Regenerative Engineering and Medicine Center, focused on harnessing the body's potential to heal.

## Woodruff Health Sciences Center (WHSC) Highlights and Impact

- Clinical Trials: More than any other Georgia institution, Emory had 2,428 active clinical trials with 70,351 actively enrolled participants in FY23.
- **Economic Impact:** With \$7.6 billion in operating expenditures in FY23, the WHSC's annual economic impact on metro Atlanta is \$14.8 billion.
- Expanding Primary Care across Georgia: The Emory Healthcare Network, the most comprehensive clinically integrated network in Georgia, and Southeast Primary Care Partners, the state's largest primary care-focused independent medical group, have aligned to provide Georgians greater access to primary care physicians and seamless care to specialists.

Southeast Primary Care Partners have 49 locations across the state with 143 providers located in those clinics, with additional locations across the Southeast. The Emory Healthcare Network consists of 11 hospitals and over 500 provider locations throughout Georgia with over 3,700 physicians working in more than 70 specialties, including specialists through its academic medical center. Together, the collaboration aims to expand services and expertise to individuals seeking health care closer to home.

With the addition of Southeast Primary Care Partners, the Emory Healthcare Network will offer more than 500 primary care physicians that patients can access for care. Physicians within Southeast Primary Care Partners' independent network will become members of the Emory Healthcare Network, providing an open line of communications between the two organizations for seamless, integrated patient care. The organizations will evaluate electronic health record interoperability options to enhance continuity of patient care between both organizations.

To ensure success of this alignment, the organizations have formed a collaborative Operations Committee comprised of leaders from both organizations. The committee will continually evaluate the benefits of the alignment while considering opportunities to advance care delivery and services.

• Improving Brain and Heart Health: Emory University and the Georgia Institute of Technology received a \$4.8 million grant from the National Institutes of Health BRAIN Initiative to establish a center to make and globally distribute next-generation micro-technologies for neuroscience. The Center for Advanced Motor BioEngineering will make cutting-edge biosensors that were jointly developed by the two universities, disseminate them to neuroscientists across the country and around the world, and provide training and other resources for how to use the biosensors to explore a range of research questions. Additionally, the Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing received a \$3.9 million grant from the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke to study the contribution of the oral microbiome to Alzheimer's disease risk.

Pioneering care and innovation came together with the expansion of Emory University Hospital's new heart and vascular facilities. The state-of-the-art care spaces with advanced technology are the result of an \$87.7 million investment from Emory Healthcare. The enhanced and fully equipped spaces in the hospital opened for procedural services in March 2024, with cardiovascular critical care services already underway. The new facilities, located on the third and fourth floors of the Emory University Hospital Tower feature a new 16-bed cardiovascular intensive care unit, a suite of new cardiovascular and thoracic operating rooms, catheterization laboratories and electrophysiology laboratories, all with innovative technology and the latest equipment to advance patient care.

• Improving Community Mental Health: The U.S. Health Resources and Services Administration awarded the Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing a five-year, \$2.6 million grant to support a program that will increase the number of advanced practice nurses and licensed clinical social workers treating mental illness and substance use disorders in nine Georgia counties. The Advanced Practice Provider Integrated Substance Use Disorder Training Program will provide training opportunities for nurses and social workers in primary care clinics and community-based organizations in Bacon, Bibb, Clarke, Coffee, Floyd, Seminole, Thomas, Tift, and Ware counties. The training will integrate primary care, mental health, and substance/opioid use disorder prevention and treatment.

The program will train 40 advanced practice nurses and 10 licensed clinical social workers over five years and employ a sustainability plan to continue its work. The online curriculum will cover neurobiology, social determinants of mental health, adverse life experiences, relapse prevention, DEI, harm reduction, care for vulnerable populations, and trauma-informed care. The program will also develop partnerships with community-based primary care clinics and organizations that treat substance use disorders and mental illness.

- **Jobs:** With 34,710 employees, the WHSC helps make Emory one of the largest employers in metro Atlanta.
- **Philanthropy:** In FY23, the WHSC was awarded \$270.4 million in private support from individuals, foundations, and corporations.
- Physician Workforce: Emory's medical school provides more than half of the residency training positions in the state of Georgia with its 118 accredited residency training programs.

 Providing State-of-the-Art Cancer Care for all Georgians: The National Cancer Institute (NCI) renewed Winship Cancer Institute's designation as Georgia's only NCI-designated Comprehensive Cancer Center.

The NCI comprehensive designation is the highest federal rating a cancer center can achieve. It is the gold standard for cancer programs, first earned by Winship in 2009. The grant was renewed in 2012, and Winship achieved comprehensive status in 2017. The renewal of Winship's NCI designation reaffirms that Winship is reducing the cancer burden in the state of Georgia through research conducted in its scientific laboratories, clinical trials, population-based research, education and training programs, and community outreach and engagement. For all Georgians, the Comprehensive Cancer Center designation recognizes that Winship researchers are studying the cancer issues unique to Georgia and that Winship is engaging the community in its research.

As Georgia's only NCI-designated center, Winship is the state's leading cancer resource, with a tripartite mission of research, education, and patient care and a commitment to preventing, detecting, and treating cancer statewide. Patients across the state and around the world can tap into Winship's clinical trials for more treatment options and first-in-human studies. Winship also provides outreach to historically underserved populations in Georgia to ensure that members of these communities have the same opportunities as all other patients in the state.

- Research Dollars: The WHSC received \$1.005 billion in research funds in FY 2023.
- Technology Transfer: Emory currently manages more than 1,800 technologies, which has led to the formation of 138 companies and more than 65 new products in the marketplace, some of which—like the discovery of several HIV drugs—have offered major health and societal benefit. Since FY 2000, the university has filed more than 3,400 U.S. patent applications and been issued more than 800 U.S. patents. In that time, Emory has executed more than 850 license agreements, resulting in more than \$1.3 billion in licensing revenue, thereby creating additional funding for new and ongoing research.


